THE SUN SHINES ~ AUTHOR'S NOTES

The first section of this publication, the picture book, is designed to support early readers with the choice and size of typeface, and line breaks that allow for the smooth flow of language. The illustrations are created to encourage conversation.

The second section of this book is presented in text form and without pictures. Sentences flow to a full line, and the five short acts each appear on a separate page. Here the reader has the opportunity of focusing on the music, form, and play of words, as well as their meaning.

Speech quotes are omitted from both versions as this allows for more open and poetic reading. The last sentence has no full stop as the sun continues to shine.

As I read the second section, the words flow differently as compared with when I read the story with images. With the written text I experience words by their shape and sound, in mind or air, and through my imagination.

Words become within us. Saying words out loud, repeating them, even whispering them, transforms them.



I love the warmth of the Sun!







What is that blue? Asks the Sun.

And the Sun shines, every day.





MY SECRET THOUGHTS ABOUT THE SUN SHINES

When I read words, when I look carefully at an image, or listen to music, ideas spring in to my mind. My ideas are different to yours.

What follows on this and the next three pages are some of the ideas I had when creating The Sun Shines. I hope you will read through the story a few times before reading on so that your own ideas settle in your mind and take root. It always takes me a while before I understand what I think! If someone thinks too fast, they might not think with care, and caring about everything is important as it helps us live well.

For me The Sun Shines is as much about the love between us, as a story about how humans can use the power of the sun and moon to save the earth from the harm of climate change. It is a story that can be equally viewed of happening in a short spell or over many years as it shows the earth at the start and end without the polar regions.

I think of the sun, moon, and earth and their constantly shifting relationships. They each attract one another with their force of gravity, and like humans, have different qualities. The sun is bright and big, the moon is much smaller but presented as more thoughtful and wise, and the earth, full of life and wonder.

The moon might represent a woman, the sun, a man, and the earth, someone they care for with their nature and being.

Children are often far more ready to accept different ways of thinking about what they see as compared with adults! In the picture book there are two related images that accompany each section of text. One kind has simple forms, and the other is more complex and highly textured. I enjoy both in different ways. The simple pictures are poetic. When I gaze at these my mind is calm. The richer, more complex pictures encourage me to be more curious, and my imagination tends to be more active. The overlay of words that tell the story ebbs and flows with my feelings and thoughts about the art that lays beyond them.

Rather than write about each picture, I will choose two to share my ideas about so that you are completely free to reach your own thoughts about the others.



Hello! Comes a voice from the Earth.

Who said that? Says the Sun.

I think I know, the Moon replies.



The scale of the first human figure in the story indicates their disproportionate impact on it. The figure is made of simple shapes that remind me of early digital representations of humans. This association triggers my thoughts about human technological progress. I am also reminded of architectural forms, and of the countless buildings, structures, and objects that humans have made.

The figure is striking in scale as it covers all the green land mass and sandy deserts before reaching out into the oceans. This is my way of showing that humans are found everywhere on earth.

For me the figure represents a woman as the spokesperson for all humans, although the visual representation of people are deliberately uncertain. I hope the colour and form of the human figure serves to symbolise humanity. The figure has no legs so it could be a different or damaged person. They could be young or old, and from any place. Their arms are outstretched and this could be interpreted as a friendly welcoming gesture, or perhaps a wave as they look out towards the sun and moon.

The heavy grains of the moon image shows it as a shadowy magical place. The scattered seeds of light remind me of the speckly TV pictures of the first landing on the moon I watched live as a child in 1969. This image also reminds me of two humans riding together on a moon buggy. The long neck below the circle could also be viewed of as an antenna that sends the first pictures from one world to another.

I think of the crescent of the moon as a benevolent shape of light as the large abstract figures walk about its surface. It is as if the travellers from earth are supported by the moon as they explore their nearest neighbour.

So a lot is going on in *The Sun Shines!* The story of how the sun and moon give, and how humans can take and use solar power, wind, and the energy from the waves to sustain human living on earth is a starting place to think about how we have the choice to act with more thought and care.

These are my personal impressions and ideas about the story, they are not things other people will necessarily interpret, but they are potential readings of its text and pictures. The illustrations are my attempt at visual poetry in that they use simple shapes to carry layers of meaning. What those layers become is very much up to you.

You are also welcome to hear the music that can be played when reading the story as this may add a further layer to your experience.

I hope you return to reshape your own story of *The Sun Shines* over time!
